With its wealth of architectural delights—from the stunning Royal Palace to the exquisite medieval finery of its many churches—Madrid is rightly proud of a generous cultural heritage. But the old and the new go hand-in-hand in this cosmopolitan city which boasts some of the world's most vibrant nightlife.



If you're an art lover, the El Prado Museum houses one of the finest collections of European art to be found anywhere, with nearly 20,000 paintings, drawings, prints and sculptures. Works by old masters like Goya, Titian, Velázquez and Rubens are on display and regular exhibitions are held throughout the year. Modern art is well represented too, with the Reina Sofía Museum hosting many great 20th century works, including Picasso's famous masterpiece Guernica. You can soak up the flavour of Madrid's intriguing past with visits to the 2000-year-old Debod Temple, the beautiful Retiro Park and the truly opulent Royal Palace.





# When the sun goes down...


Interested in the nightlife? Madrid doesn't disappoint, offering a scintillating array of cafes, tapas bars, clubs and restaurants. Being a night owl is very much in Madrid's style and those partying into the small hours will find themselves in good company. The locals don't hit the streets until well after dark, and when they do the city becomes alive with the unmistakable ambience of a good night out. Here too, Spain effortlessly blends young and old, traditional and modern. Whether you're after hardcore clubbing or open air flamenco, a light bite or a hearty meal, Madrid has plenty to offer.



# Shop till you drop...

From the mainstream to the offbeat, Madrid's shops have something to suit all tastes. The pedestrian-only Calle Preciados plays host to many traditional clothes and shoe shops, most of which open till 8.30 in the evening and on Sundays too. Along Calle Fuencarral and adjoining streets is a veritable jungle of small boutiques, and the nearby area of Malasaña is fast becoming a hotspot for unique designs and vintage clothes. If you're after smart, international merchandise from the likes of Chanel, Gucci, Prada and Dolce & Gabbana, then head for the grid of streets in the Salamanca district.





# Valencia

Situated on the banks of the river Turia and nestled against the warm Mediterranean, the old Roman colony of Valencia is Spain's third largest city. This enchanting place is renowned as the birthplace of paella. Valencia features several beaches just out of town and the city itself is home to many architectural gems.

# Good Fallas...

If you're after a hot night in Spain, then put 19th March in your diary. Valencia lights up as the city's neighbourhoods come together to burn ceremonial monuments in honour of Saint Joseph. These fallas, or torches, are constructed by community groups throughout the year, before being spectacularly ignited in a ceremony known as la cremà, which means "burning". This fascinating and ancient festival begins on March 15th and continues through five days of wall-to-wall partying, with processions, music, and fireworks throughout the city. See the fallas, watch the parades and dance all night long.



# Best of the Rest

# La Rioja

The northern region bearing the name of Spain's most famous wine is situated just below Basque country, at the far western end of the Ebro Valley. Wine making is centred in the town of Haro, where you can visit most of the vineyards as well as a wine museum. If you're not averse to getting a little wet then visit Haro on 29th June for its annual "wine battle", when two sides drench each other in thousands of litres of the red stuff; otherwise, stand well back for some great photo opportunities.



# Mallorca

Mallorca is the largest of the Balearic Islands, an archipelago in the Mediterranean off Spain's eastern coast. Offering plentiful sunshine, a busy nightlife and copious shops and restaurants, this ever-popular destination has been home to several notables, including Michael Douglas, Claudia Schiffer and tennis superstar Rafael Nadal. It's no surprise that olives form a staple part of the Mallorcan diet, as the island is covered in millions of olive and almond trees. Islanders are especially proud of their traditional cuisine of sobrassada—a sausage made with pork, paprika and other spices—and the sweet pastry ensaïmada.

# Gran Caneria


Called "Land of the Brave" by the Canarii settlers of over 2000 years ago, Gran Caneria is jam-packed with things to see and do—especially if you're the outdoors type. Relax on the glittering sands of its endless beaches; enjoy the ambience of its friendly seaside resorts; stroll the sleepy streets of its whitewashed mountainside villages. Its stupendous range of "micro-climates" has led to this fascinating island being labelled a "miniature continent", where dunes of bright white sand and deep, verdant ravines live side-by-side. Almost half of the island is a protected area and there are several nature reserves and natural parks.





# Tenerife

Once a poor banana-growing island, Tenerife—the largest of the Canaries—has been transformed by the air tourism that began in the 1960s. The sheer variety of its landscape is astonishing, encompassing dense forests, scenic coastlines, deserts, mountains, volcanoes and magnificent beaches. The 12,000-foot peak of Mount Teide, Spain's highest mountain, forms a dramatic division between the island's north and south. Drivers up for a challenge will appreciate the many winding mountain routes accompanied by breathtaking scenery at every turn. There is a large zoo and animal park outside of Puerto de la Cruz, and the island is popular with go-karters, cyclists and scuba divers.

### La Boqueria

visit to la Boqueria is a feast on the senses and a sprawling shrine to fresh produce. Even if you are travelling all inclusive we would still recommend visiting the most famous market in Europe. As you arrive at the large arched entrance you will be overcome with awe. The scent of food from all nationalities will leave you salivating, the vibrant colours of the fresh and candied fruits will dazzle and amaze, while the lively sounds of the noisy stallholders add to the charm of the overall experience. That is without even mentioning the succulent flavours of the tasty produce on offer.

Many visitors mistake la Boqueria as being just another tourist spectacle due to its gathering crowds and its prime location on Las Ramblas, but that is not the case. Everyone from gourmet chefs to the local residents do their shopping here as many of the specialist produce can only be found in this market place. After a few visits you will no longer be bemused by shoppers carrying entire pigs or spotting the weird and wonderful items on display such as black eels and bull's tails. It will become part and parcel of the day-to-day life

et out of the tourist trap and experience some of the quaint local neighbourhoods that can be found around the outskirts of Barcelona. Walk through the narrow cobbled streets and gaze upon the characteristic architecture found throughout. Gracia is home to a bohemian crowd basking in the trendy main squares and is the destination for many striking art nouveau buildings.

Throughout these diverse districts you will encounter every type of shop: high-end designer, artsy boutique, centuries-old specialty, family-run, mainstream commercial and momn-pop hole-in-the-wall. Get some retail therapy by browsing the many fabulous shops or simply kick back and soak up the Mediterranean lifestyle in one of the cosy cafes or atmospheric bars.



In the evening, head to the resurgent district of Polbe Nou, where the Barcelona skyline is pierced with the architectural masterpiece known as the Torre Agbar. As the headquarters of a water company, the 38-storey skyscraper may appear to be just another office space but at night time it is a marvellous light show for the city residents when 4,500 LED luminous devices provide a radiant and glowing sight for those all around.

arcelona is a very artsy city. It is rammed full of fascinating museums and aesthetically pleasing galleries. But the best exhibition on display is the vibrant and modern district of Eixample. Here you will find an explosion of colour and a series of wonderful buildings which look like they have been plucked straight out of a diry-tale.

The fascinating mixture of medieval and art nouveau buildings often play second fiddle to the moderniste architecture and distinctive works of Antoni Gaudi - Barcelona's most famous architect. The moderniste movement created an art form that was almost entirely unique to Catalonia. With curved lines and rounded features, dynamism of forms, and nature-based characteristics with flowers, plants and animals - this is certainly an art form which stands out from the crowd.





The whimsical Casa Batllo is one of the most eye-catching structures as much of the façade is decorated with a mosaic made of golden orange and greenish blue broken ceramic tiles while its roof has been likened to the back of a dragon or dinosaur. Another exquisite example of moderniste design is the stunningly beautiful interior at Colonia Guell. The church was designed by Gaudi, and the crypt is still considered to be one of his most spectacular works of all time.

"Stray from the main avenues such as Passeig de Gracia and allow yourself to get lost on some of the Eixample side streets and admire some of the fantastic "moderniste" architecture that doesn't get mentioned in guidebooks. Try the streets of Enrique Granados, Aribau, and Calle Consell de Cent, Provenza."



#### For The Art Lovers...

ut of the three Guggenheim Museums that are currently in operation you could easily group New York and Venice together. New York hosts Solomon R. Guggenheim's private collection while Venice hosts Peggy Guggenheim's treasure trove. Between them, they hold some of the greatest European and American art of the first half of the 1900s.

Bilbao on the other hand offers something unique and different. Its collection spans from the mid-twentieth century to the present day and includes some key works by the most significant artists of this period such as Willem de Kooning, Gerhard Richter and Andy Warhol. The museum concentrates on post-war painting and sculpture in America and Europe. As a result, it is always striving to remain contemporary and relevant.

Frank Gehry's spectacular twisting titanium-clad ultra-modern and unmistakable art building was hailed by architect Philip Johnson as "the greatest building of our time" and since its completion in 1997 it has become something of an emblem for the city of Bilbao.









### San Sebastian

#### For The Food Lovers...

ith more Michelin star chefs per head than any other city there is little surprise that San Sebastian is recognised as the culinary capital of Spain. Three of the five Michelin three star restaurants of Spain reside in San Sebastian, and they are complemented by a great selection of restaurants that hold a further 16 Michelin stars.

You do not necessarily have to seek out the gourmet and haute establishments as you will soon find that almost every gastronomic offering is both fancy and luxurious in equal measures. Saunter through the narrow streets of the historic Old Town and the colours, smells and tastes will tempt you into the tapas bars that line the streets on your way toward the small marina and San Sebastian castle.

The Basques are fishing folk by ancient tradition and their most famous dishes are pintxos which is the local version of Spanish tapas. This can include bite sized snacks of tiger mussels, foie gras with figs, sardines and grilled baby squid. All of which will have been caught fresh that day. Make sure you visit the main market where the fish counters are a pleasure to behold, and the fresh fruit and vegetables are mouth-wateringly good.

Once you have had your fill of San Sebastian's exquisite flavours there is no better way to spend the rest of your time than relaxing on La Concha Beach or taking in the views from Mount Igeldo. Even though it is most famous for its cuisine, San Sebastian also happens to be one of the most beautiful cities in all of Spain.







f you believe the myth that the only Spanish dish worth eating is paella then you would probably believe that the only drink worth swilling is their sangria. In both instances you would be horribly mistaken.

The Spanish are equally familiar with producing a good bottle of red and their native Tempranillo grape is famous all around the world. Producing a full-bodied wine with full fruit flavoured characteristics; they are perhaps one of the most food friendly wines around. It is often referred to as Spain's noble grape and is the main varietal in Spain's Rioja wines.

Take a day trip to Rioja to visit the local cave-style wineries in Laguardia Village and learn about their fascinating wine making process. Also, be sure to visit the Marques del Riscal wine cellar for an exquisite sampling session. This building was designed by the very same architect that created the spectacular Guggenheim museum in Bilbao.





#### La Carrera del Darro

f you like your scenic walks then you will definitely love Carrera del Darro. It is one of the oldest streets in Granada and is full of authentic Spanish charm. The street dates back to the seventeenth century and many of the great buildings which stood here during that period still remain today.

Carrera del Darro is not just about the narrow cobbled paths and typically Spanish buildings. It is also a place to relax and enjoy the beautiful natural scenery. It runs between the River Darro and the forests of Alhambra and Almanzora, providing excellent landscapes whatever time of day you visit.

If you visit during the evenings your journey may be graced by the presence of street musicians jamming along. There are two brick and stone bridges along the walk which links you to the Churra district. Allow yourself the time to cross over and explore the chic and dilettante lifestyle held within.

#### Alcaiceria

he name Alcaiceria literally means either the 'house of Caesar' or 'belonging to Caesar' in recognition of the fact that Emperor Justinian, of the ancient Byzantine Empire, granted the Moors permission to make and sell silk here.

Although the original market place was destroyed by a fire in 1843, it was considered too important to both trade and tourism to just let it lie and as a result the current market was rebuilt in the space of just two years.

Maintaining its links to ancient times, the Alcaiceria still preserves traces of the Arab souks along with some memories of the bustling market activity from the Nasrid Dynasty. While you will no longer find a mass collection of silk stores, Alcaiceria is still well worth a visit. The street runs from Plaza Alonso Cano and is full of souvenir shops and typical bric-a-brac.



"The Alcaiceria is one of the last Arab souks of Europe. It is located in the centre of Granada, between the Cathedral and the Zacatín Catholic Kings. In the late nineteenth century it suffered a major fire that left it burned to ashes. After being rebuilt in neo-Moorish style houses in narrow streets craft shops, traditional items, teas, incense, leather goods, spices."

he Arch of Elvira – commonly referred to as the Elvira Gate – was originally one of the gates in the city's fortifications. While the walls have long been demolished, the Moorish-style archway still remains. There is evidence from a 17th century engraving that the gate dates back to the 11th century, and a guided tour by an expert will share all of the old tales and gruesome stories of how the gates allegedly displayed the rotting heads of executed criminals.

Try not to linger too long around the Arch of Elvira because this is not necessarily the main attraction. As you pass through the gateway, you will continue on to Calle Elvira. It is here that you will find the life and soul of Granada with its many shops and vast array of



vibrant bars.

nstead of heading northbound as you pass through the Arch of Elvira, venture towards the south where you will arrive at the Plaza Nueva. Despite the names translation as New Square, it is in fact the oldest square in Granada and lies between the modern centre and the Carrera del Darro.

Around the square are several important buildings such as the Royal Chancellery and the House of Pisa while it is also home to numerous monuments such as the Fountain of the Bull which features a bull in the centre spouting water and a young boy on either side. Those who know the history of the region may already be aware that this square was once one of the most important centres in Granada and supposedly held bullfights in its centre.

Visit the Plaza Nueva during the summer and you will be greeted with excellent terraces from which to observe the peaceful tranquillity of this historic region.




he Realejo was the Jewish area during the Arabic kingdom of Granada and although the area has changed significantly throughout time it is still affectionately known as the Jewish Quarter. In 1501, all of the churches in Granada were converted into Christian places of worship and many visitors are still drawn in to browse the San Cecilio's Church, built on an old mosque, as well as the Convent of the Discaled Carmelitas.

The neighbourhood is now a heavily populated district and its streets are vibrant with a distinctive character. Walking down the streets of Realejo, you will see numerous examples of fascinating modernist architecture as well as the 16th century Palace of La Casa de los Tiros. A trip to the most famous square, El Campe del Principe comes highly recommended. Anybody who would like to get a real flavour of Granada should definitely sample the surrounding tapas and bars.







# **Jack Nicklaus Golf Trail**

The 'Jack Nicklaus Golf Trail' is a golfing project based in the Murcia region of south-eastern Spain, all of which carries the signature of the most accomplished golfer of all time.

The complete experience allows visitors to play a round of golf at six of the most aesthetically pleasing, highly maintained, quality courses that continental Europe has to offer. Each course carries the brand name of 'Nicklaus Design', the design firm of Jack Nicklaus. The former American golfer commanded an unbridled winning mentality during his playing days, and he continues to possess the same mentality in his course design, driving 'Nicklaus Design' to become a global leader.

"The Golden Bear" won an unprecedented 18 major championships in his career, and currently has 365 courses open for play worldwide. The six that belong to the 'Golf Trail' are each located within a twenty-five kilometre radius of each other, allowing keen golf enthusiasts to travel from one to the next in a golfing experience like no other.

# **Alhama**

Located in a luscious nature reserve is this 18-hole 72 par signature course. Alhama is a large and spacious course that perfectly incorporates the surrounding untouched natural landscape into its riveting design. Jack Nicklaus designed the course in the second half of the last decade and the venue opened in 2009. It opened to rave reviews, being popular with media and golfers alike. The strong praise given to the course culminated in its inclusion amongst 'Golf World' magazine's highest rated European courses of 2011.

Alhama itself carries an 'open parkland' layout, with a smoothly sloping surface. It is just shy of 7,000 metres long, but its strategic layout means that you cannot simply hit and hope. Each hole requires you to pick each shot carefully, or risk being halted by its major obstacles. Scattered around the course are five large lakes, a variation of bunkers and trees that line the courses' edge.

### **Saurines**

From the mid 1990's to the early 2000's, Jack Nicklaus expanded his course design empire to Las Vegas, which is characterised by its location beside the Nevada dessert. Nicklaus' three courses in Las Vegas form the inspiration behind Saurines, the next course in his Spanish project. Located in the Terrazas del Torre complex,

Saurines is an 18-hole, 72-par course which incorporates the natural features of its surrounding dessert into its design. Saurines compelling dessert aesthetic is visually known for its sand dunes rather than a filmic dessert scene, setting it aside from Nicklaus' El Valle course. The course has a gently undulating terrain, with greens that are surrounded by dunes and bunkers. However, Saurines trickiest obstacle comes in the form of a giant six acre lake that can be found in the centre of holes 9 and 18.

This mammoth water hazard can make even the most experienced golfer feel uneasy; ramping up the pressure in this truly thrilling round of golf.

Jewish Quarter

Yet the district is still known as the old juderia with many of its narrow winding streets still standing. The Jewish Quarter is one of the most charming districts in the whole of Seville and attracts a large number of visitors during their venture to the Cathedral.



Take a peaceful cruise along the Guadalquivir River followed by a stroll through the narrow, winding medieval lanes of the Jewish Quarter and by the time you arrive at the Santa Maria Cathedral – you may be thinking of other church bells. The subtlety of Seville makes it one of the most romantic cities in Europe.
